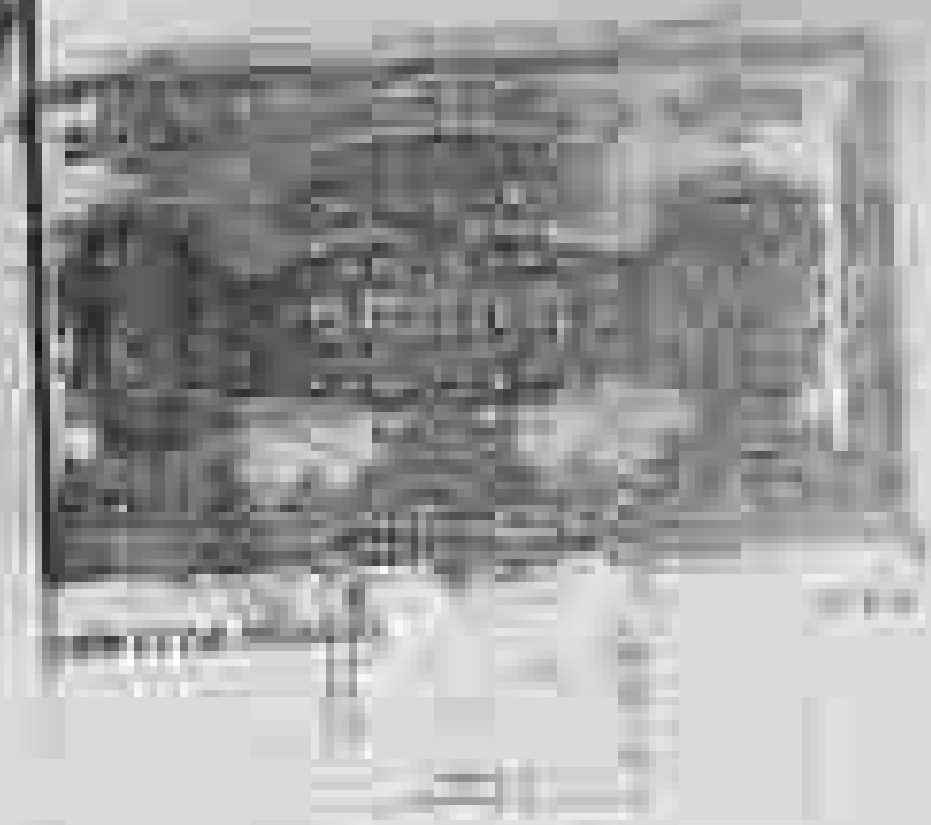


Fig. 1. Micrograph showing the distribution of small, dark, circular spots (likely biological or material samples) across a large rectangular area.

AND THE QUANTUM TUNNELING EFFECT

1. The harmonic oscillator is a fundamental system in quantum mechanics. It is a particle of mass m moving in a potential $V(x) = \frac{1}{2}kx^2$. The energy levels are given by $E_n = \hbar\omega(n + \frac{1}{2})$, where $\omega = \sqrt{k/m}$. The ground state energy is $E_0 = \frac{1}{2}\hbar\omega$. The wave functions are given by $\psi_n(x) = N_n H_n(\alpha x) e^{-\alpha^2 x^2/2}$, where $\alpha = \sqrt{m\omega/\hbar}$ and H_n are the Hermite polynomials.
