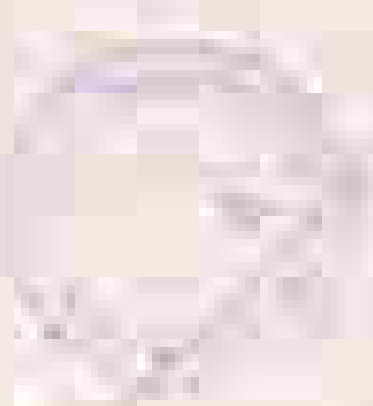
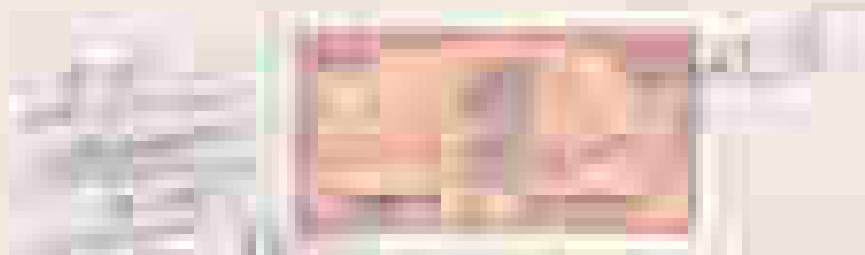
Older adults' perceptions of the impact of intergenerational relationships on their well-being were examined. Data were drawn from the Survey of Health, Aging, and Retirement in America, a nationally representative longitudinal study of older adults. Results indicate that older adults who have frequent contact with their children and grandchildren report higher levels of well-being and lower levels of depression and disability. These findings suggest that intergenerational relationships are an important source of social support for older adults.
